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MEDIA RELEASE: SUPPLY NATION CONNECT 2017

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Connect 2017: celebrating the growth of the Indigenous economic sector

Connect is Supply Nation's annual supplier diversity event, held over two days (3rd and 4th May 2017). Connect comprises a full day Knowledge Forum (conference), the largest Indigenous Business Tradeshow in Australia, and the annual Gala Awards Dinner at which the Supplier Diversity Award winners are announced.

Knowledge Forum – 3rd May, International Convention Centre, Darling Harbour, Major Sponsor: Staples

This year's Connect Knowledge forum was attended by over 350 delegates and featured more than 30 speakers. The line-up included an opening keynote from multi-award winning author and journalist, Stan Grant; an address from the Minister for Indigenous Affairs, Senator the Hon. Nigel Scullion and a closing keynote from Australia's leading futurist, Bernard Salt.

Laura Berry, CEO of Supply Nation, welcomed the attendees and spoke about the theme of Connect 2017 "Supplier Diversity is everyone's business – it's not only the theme of today's conference, it's also a fundamental driver for everything we do at Supply Nation. We believe that supplier diversity is not just the responsibility of a small section of the business eco-system, but a systemic, top-to-bottom way of doing business."

She continued, acknowledging that whilst there is still work to do, the Indigenous business sector is growing "There are more Indigenous-owned businesses than ever in Australia; Supply Nation registered Indigenous businesses collectively earn more than \$1 billion per year with revenues growing at an average annual rate of 12.5%; Indigenous businesses are far more likely to employ other Indigenous people – despite Indigenous people only making up 3% of the population. On Supply Nation's directory, Indigenous Business Direct, Indigenous employment averages 40%."

Ms Berry concluded, urging each attendee to "Use the lever of procurement to work toward a more inclusive and diverse Australia."

Stan Grant discussed the history of Indigenous peoples as one of resilience, and success – and applied that concept to business. He spoke about his story and how he has been driven to succeed. Despite the fact that there are major social inequities still weighing on Australian society, his message was one of inspiration – that our stories define us, and that we need more stories of Indigenous success.

The Minister for Indigenous Affairs, Senator the Hon. Nigel Scullion announced a broad consultation project that has the potential to change the way Indigenous businesses access finance, capacity building services and mentoring. He spoke passionately about the success of the Indigenous Procurement Policy and driving Australian corporate and government buyers to understand that doing business with Indigenous businesses is the new normal. The Minister also announced the 18 month results of the Indigenous Procurement Policy which show that \$407 million in contracts have been awarded to 708 separate businesses.

A panel of Australia's top CEOs spoke about their top-down commitment to supplier diversity, and the benefits they have seen from incorporating Indigenous businesses into their supply chains. The delegates



then broke into a series of workshops – each designed to address a specific concern or question about supplier diversity, either from the perspective of the supplier or the buying organisation.

The day concluded with a trademark energetic and engaging presentation from Bernard Salt. He used data to illustrate the growth areas in Australia – including China-focused tourism and developing businesses to serve our aging retired population.

Indigenous Business Tradeshow - 4th May, International Convention Centre, Darling Harbour, Major Sponsor: Compass Group

Over 1,100 tickets were issued for the biggest ever Indigenous business tradeshow which showcased 143 successful Indigenous businesses. With demonstrations of rope climbing technology; a branded race car; presentations from members about opportunities for Indigenous businesses; a series of mini-training sessions by high-profile presenters including Creel Price and Kristal Kinsela; Google VR demonstrations and food and drink provided by sponsor Compass Group – the energy in the room was infectious.

Laura Berry, CEO of Supply Nation, commented "Every year, we hear stories of business connections made at the Tradeshow that deliver contracts worth hundreds of millions of dollars. The Tradeshow this year was the biggest exhibition of Indigenous businesses ever in Australia, with hundreds of motivated government and corporate decision makers and buyers who were there to connect with Indigenous businesses."

"The success of the Federal Government's Indigenous Procurement Policy – which saw an almost 5,000% increase in spend in one financial year - is an obvious driver in the sector. But it's not the only factor." Ms Berry continued, "The announcement by The Minister for Indigenous Affairs, Senator the Hon. Nigel Scullion at the Knowledge Forum of the results from the Indigenous Procurement Policy over the last 18 months just shows that setting hard targets works – and we're increasingly seeing state and local government and even large corporates setting their own Indigenous procurement targets to complement their RAP commitments."

Gala Awards Dinner – 4th May, The Star Event Centre, Pyrmont, Major Sponsor: Commonwealth Bank

Hosted by the effervescent Casey Donovan and Aaron Fa'Aso, the Connect 2017 Gala Awards Dinner attracted over 740 guests from Indigenous businesses and Supply Nation member organisations. The annual finale to Connect, the black tie event featured stellar Indigenous entertainment from the Muggera Dancers, and multiple Aria award-winner, Christine Anu, with Casey Donovan providing an impromptu serenade half way through the evening which brought the house down.

The main purpose of the Gala Awards Dinner is to announce Supply Nation's Supplier Diversity Award winners. Celebrating the best in Australian Supplier Diversity, these awards recognise the organisations and individuals that are delivering outstanding results in the space, and excellence in Australian business.

This year there was a 25% increase in nominations, again illustrating the growth, maturity and dynamic nature of the sector.
